From the Desk of the Pastor ...

Occasionally in sports when a higher ranked team is losing to a lower ranked team, the crowds may begin the chant, "Overrated!" It is a clever dig against the losing side, suggesting they are not as good as people appraised them to be. There is a king in Israel's history that truly deserves the label, "overrated."

I asked a Bible study to name the top 3 greatest kings of Israel. Solomon routinely made the list, even reaching #1 with one group. Had I not read about his life, I would have placed him on my list. Why? Because Solomon was the wise king. He asked the LORD for wisdom and received it. His request was one of his few praiseworthy actions.

Before you think I am being harsh, just read about Solomon's life. Early on in I Kings he becomes the focal point. His father David gave Solomon good advice in telling him:

Keep the charge of the LORD your God, to walk in His ways, to keep His statutes, His commandments, His ordinances, and His testimonies, according to what is written in the Law of Moses, that you may succeed in all that you do and wherever you turn, so that the LORD may carry out His promise which He spoke concerning me, saying, 'If your sons are careful of their way, to walk before Me in truth with all their heart and with all their soul, you shall not lack a man on the throne of Israel."

Unfortunately, David, the king with a checkered life, immediately turns to enjoining his son to take revenge on those whom he still held a grudge. Soon after he became king, Solomon exacted revenge on behalf of his late father. In the future, Solomon would need no prompting to make poor decisions.

Solomon soon turned to using marriage to build foreign alliances and allowed his multitudinous wives to sacrifice to false gods. He commanded many building projects that included the Temple of the LORD and his own palace. The palace was much bigger than the Temple. He needed laborers for these projects and used his power to conscript men in Israel to give up a quarter of their year to provide the construction.

LaSor, Hubbard, and Bush remarked about Solomon's trading:

Solomon's commercial enterprises brought fabulous wealth to Jerusalem. Unfortunately, this wealth did not benefit all classes in Israel. Nor did it relieve the severe taxation necessary to support the massive building enterprises. The commoner, in fact, may have been less comfortable under Solomon than under David and Saul. The tendency toward centralization of wealth which angered the great prophets of the eighth century began in Solomon's golden reign.

The most damning evidence for Solomon's overrated reign was his own participation in idolatry. Recall David's advice to his son to follow the commandments written in the Law of Moses. The first command is "you shall have no other gods before me." The particle used for prohibiting the worship of other gods has a permanent, absolute durative value. Solomon did not participate in the worship of other gods early in his reign though he allowed others this sin. If only his abstinence from other gods early in his kingship had the same permanent durative value. I Kings 11:4-8 states:

For when Solomon was old, his wives turned his heart away after other gods; and his heart was not wholly devoted to the LORD his God, as the heart of David his father had been. For Solomon went after Ashtoreth the goddess of the Sidonians and after Milcom the detestable idol of the Ammonites. Solomon did what was evil in the sight of the LORD, and did not follow the LORD fully, as David his father had done. Then Solomon built a high place for Chemosh the detestable idol of Moab, on the mountain which is east of Jerusalem, and for Molech the detestable idol of the sons of Ammon. Thus also he did for all his foreign wives, who burned incense and sacrificed to their gods.

Name anyone who had so many God-given advantages (divinely powered wisdom!) and yet did so little with them. You can understand why I might suddenly begin to chant "overrated" if someone begins to praise Solomon. For me, Solomon represents moral compromise, valuing the wrong things, and dereliction of duty to be a guardian of the faith.


